#### ARRANGEMENTS FOR TRIPS

Coaches depart promptly from SCHOOL STREET, Newcastle, behind the Jubilee Swimming Baths. Nearby there is long-stay parking. Should a member cancel a booking it is regretted that reimbursement is only possible if there is a waiting list. There will be a £2 per cheque handling charge. Members are requested not to find their own replacements. Non-members taking part in our trips pay an additional £2 for coach outings and an additional £1 for car outings. The committee has agreed that it is only fair that members should have priority when booking trips and holidays.

Members are asked to note that it is not possible for the coach to stop at places other than School Street to pick people up or drop them off on the outward or return journeys. The coach will not wait for members who are late, either at School Street or at other pick up points. Members are advised to take careful note of when or where they will be picked up. Anyone missing a coach will have no claim on the Association.

It will greatly help organisers if you will make cheques payable to the "The North Staffs National Trust Association" and note that normally cheques are not cleared until after an event. Please send a separate cheque and a separate self-addressed envelope for each separate event even when these go to one organiser. People who wish to ensure that they sit together on a coach should use one booking form.

**Note:** The committee does not consider it proper that an event should incur a loss and therefore reserves the right to cancel should there be insufficient support.

#### For Your Safety and Enjoyment

Please look carefully at what is involved in an outing or a holiday before booking. Consider the starting time, the length of the day, the amount of walking and stairclimbing involved, the number of times of getting on and off a coach, etc. so that you can enjoy the day to the full by being able to participate in all aspects of the outing.

If you have a problem with mobility or hearing, for example, please let the organiser know as soon as possible and we will try to arrange some help but we cannot guarantee to do so. There is an induction loop at the NS Conf. Centre.

## Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> June: Car Outing: An Historical Walk around Nantwich.

Following the success of April's much oversubscribed event it has been decided to repeat it this summer.

Even if you are familiar with Nantwich's shops and hostelries, how much do you know about its often turbulent past and wealth of stunning buildings? Conquest, fire and siege destroyed the town at various points in its long history, but its reconstruction has left an abundance of beautiful timber-framed buildings and it retains much of its ancient character.

Join Rose Wheat for a walk around the town and learn about the disasters that have befallen it and the people who shaped its history. Meet at 2.00pm in the churchyard of St Mary's church, our starting point for this gentle walk of one and a half to two hours.

## Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> June: Coach Trip to Bourton House Garden and Sezincote, Moreton in Marsh, Gloucestershire.

The House at Bourton has been remodelled many times in its history, the adjacent Elizabethan Tithe Barn reached a state of perfection at an early date, but it is only in the last thirty years that the garden has been brought up to match them in splendour. The new owners, who took it on five years ago, continued with the established garden team and are pledged to maintain and develop its beauty. The design and the planting of this garden make it one of the best in the country. There are ever widening herbaceous borders, knots, parterres, natural springs, inspirational planting for winter and summer and unusual plants. Tender exotics are a feature of the garden as are creatively filled containers. Our visit coincides with them being placed outside, but so much depends on mild weather. The Garden is three acres with a ten acre arboretum.

Refreshments, (included), will be served on arrival. There will then be two and a half hours to tour the garden and have lunch. (The House is a private home and not open).

At 1.30 we shall drive round the corner to Sezincote. This is the 'Home of The Oaks' in mangled old French. It is now the home of Dr & Mrs Peake who are opening exclusively for us. Please practice saying" Seezincut". The owners in the 1790s were relatives of Samuel Pepys called Cockerell. They were also called 'nabobs' because they had amassed a fortune in The East India Company. They were, however, genuinely interested in the Mogul culture of Rajasthan and wanted to be reminded of their time there. The architect was the owner's brother. However, nabobs' business methods were coming to be regarded as questionable and decadence was suspect, so, as if to demonstrate domestic respectability, the interior is chaste Greek Revival One person who visited as the house was being finished in 1807 was The Prince of Wales, later George IV. Decadence beyond suspicion appealed enormously; he altered his plans for Brighton Pavilion at once. The grounds are as sensational as the house. At 4.15.we shall return to Bourton Tithe Barn for refreshments, (included), prior to departure at 5 p.m.

## Notes which will make your visit to Bourton & Sezincote more enjoyable.

The day is topped and tailed with visits to Bourton because it has a tea room and comfort facilities which are not available at Sezincote. The Barn at Bourton is let to a tenant who runs the tea room independently.

The Garden is open to the public on the day of our visit, so the total numbers at certain times could put pressure on space and service in the Barn.

In order to ensure that you are served quickly and your preferences are available it would be a help if you could complete the refreshments part of the booking form.

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Unfortunately for those bringing their own picnic neither the owners of Bourton or Sezincote allow picnics in the gardens; the coach and parking paddock will be available. After your picnic you are welcome to return to the Barn for refreshments, but it would not be fair to deny other, paying customers, the table space or to burden the staff with resetting the table.

The Coach will leave School Street at 8.30.a.m. returning for 7 p.m. Cost £40.00 per person, (non-members £42.00), to include coach travel, driver's tip, entrance to both properties and special private visit to Sezincote,tea/coffee,morning and afternoon.

## Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> June: Car Outing: Behind the Scenes Tour at Alton Towers

This is an "after hours" tour starting at 5.30pm. We will begin with a cable car ride over the area of Alton Towers and then have a guided tour of the beautiful gardens, some of which are steep but visitors can sit on seats at the top of the valley and look down below if they wish. We will then visit parts of the mainly Pugin-designed house which has a long history. We should be able to see the recently restored conservatory, chapel and one or two of the main rooms.

The estate started to be turned into a tourist attraction in the 1890s by the Earl of Shrewsbury.

Refreshments in the form of sandwiches, cakes and tea coffee or cordials will follow in a room set aside for us after the tour. Directions for reaching the starting point will be given at the time of booking.

## Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> July: Walk – Consall Nature Park, Pub and a Picnic 5 miles, or an easy option available



This walk explores Consall
Nature Park and the delights of
the Churnet valley, where the
Cauldon Canal and the
Churnet Valley Railway
compete with each-other and
with the River Churnet itself for
space on the narrow valley
bottom.

We will meet at 10.45am at the

Visitor Centre (ST9 0AF). Our circular walk starts with a section through the wooded hillsides of the Nature Park, mostly good surfaces courtesy of Staffordshire County Council. There are some steep parts,

with steps to help us, and there are about six stiles to cross. We then descend to the valley bottom, and it's flat from then on. We cross the river, the railway and the canal, then along the towpath, passing by the old forge, an RSPB reserve, and the lovingly restored railway station.

There will be time for a well-earned break at the Black Lion pub, which has to be in one of the finest locations for any pub, anywhere. From here, its about a mile back to our cars, passing by Lawn Pool and Heron Pool. The visitor centre has a picnic area adjacent, and I suggest we bring our own hampers for an al fresco feast here, at around 2pm. The shop sells hot and cold drinks, a few sweets, and ice creams. There is also a small wildlife exhibition.

Those who wish to are welcome to opt out of the first part of the walk, and meet the group at the Black Lion at 12.30.

Dogs and children are welcome. The former should remain on leads throughout.

## Tuesday 28th July: Coach Outing to Kenilworth Castle and Packwood House.

This is an opportunity to combine a visit to a spectacular castle (English Heritage) and a lovely National Trust house, (Packwood).



Kenilworth Castle

Leaving School Street at 8.30am.we should arrive at Kenilworth around 10.00am. From the coach park we walk for several minutes along a path, formerly the tiltyard, at the end of which we get a truly impressive view of the castle. We then head towards the 16th century stable where we have tea/coffee and biscuits (included in cost). We are then split into suitable groups to be taken on both the Fortress to Palace tour and the Elizabethan Garden tour. Robert Dudley, earl of Leicester, who owned Kenilworth, had the garden created in an attempt to impress Elizabeth I sufficiently to persuade her to marry him; however this did not happen but he always remained one of her favourites. The garden has been restored to what it probably looked like in July 1575 at which time it would have been at its peak for Elizabeth's fourth and final visit to Kenilworth. The layout has been recreated from eye-witness accounts and by reference to similar gardens of the period. The upper storeys of the castle buildings can now be reached via secure metal staircases which lead on to viewing platforms from which the extent of the former pleasure grounds outside the castle walls can be seen. The staircases are very safe but also very steep and anyone not wishing to climb the stairs can get an excellent overview of the garden layout from the first-level gravel walkway.

Following the guided tours it is time for lunch, either a prepaid lunch in Leicester's Gatehouse (please see menu choice below) or if you prefer to bring a picnic there is ample provision within the grounds. After lunch you have some free time when it is recommended you explore the Gatehouse which contains some interesting exhibits and has a lift to the upper floors.

We leave at 2.00pm. for the short journey to Packwood House. You may be relieved to note that our time there is spent at your leisure! Full details of the house are in the N.T.Handbook but I would mention that the gardens here are also superb.

## Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> August: Car Outing: Abbeywood Gardens, Delamere, Cheshire, CW8 2HW.

Plant Hunters' Fairs come to Abbeywood Gardens in Cheshire just as the gardens reach their peak in August and provide an ideal opportunity for plant lovers to re-stock their gardens or search out a new or unusual plant from the many expert stall holders and nurseries who will be there.

The gardens have plenty to see and enjoy with six acres divided into separate garden areas, each with its own distinctive character and themed planting. The gardens are all set against the glorious backdrop of the Utkinton Hills. You can also walk around the rest of the estate's 40 acre arboretum and enjoy the delicious seasonal menu in the Garden Cafe which uses the soft fruit, vegetables and salad grown in the vegetable garden [lunch and other refreshments at own cost].

We will assemble at 10.30am in the cafe area which is close to the car park and the entrance to the gardens. After we are admitted to the gardens you will then be free to wander at will for the rest of the day until the gardens close at 5.00pm.

## Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> August: Coach Outing to Fulneck Moravian Settlement & Oakwell Hall.

Fulneck, south of Pudsey, was established in the mid-18<sup>th</sup> century as a settlement, centred on the church. As well as houses for families there were woollen and lace workshops and accommodation for single men, women and widows, and schools catering for both locals and missionaries children, also a bakery, shop and inn. After tea/coffee we will have a tour of the settlement ,which will include a visit to the museum housed in two of the old cottages with artefacts including an early fire engine and items from around the world brought back by the missionaries.

Lunch (at own expense or bring your own) can be taken at the Bankhouse Inn after which we move to Oakwell Hall, built in 1583 by John Batt. In the 18<sup>th</sup> century this somewhat notorious family was succeeded by a series of absentee landlords and in 1840 it became a school run by the Cockill sisters. They had been introduced by Ellen Nussey to the Bronte sisters who were considering opening a school of their own. Thus the description of 'Fieldhead' in 'Shirley' was based on Oakwell.

On the return journey, Pat Wilson, a former resident of Fulneck and relative of the Cockills, (Pat is also a longstanding member of this Association) will point out a number of places associated with the Brontes and the Cockills.

The coach will leave School Street at 8.45 am and will arrive back in Newcastle around 6.30 to 7.00pm.

Tuesday 17th February: Talk: Cathryn Walton, 'Hidden Lives:

Following our successful outing to Leek in the summer of 2013 to the exhibition of embroidery created by the

Leek Embroidery Society, we invited Cathryn Walton, cocurator of that exhibition, to talk to us about the women who actually sewed the altar pieces and tapestries with such consummate skill. In a superbly illustrated talk, Cathryn explained how Lady Elizabeth Wardle had founded the society, probably with the encouragement of William Morris and, with the help of relatives and friends, usually the wives and daughters of Leek's professional class and mill owners, had established 'Leek Embroidery', recognized by its patterns throughout the country and overseas.

In addition to these volunteer embroiderers, the society also employed two professionals who taught young girls from the 'lower orders' of Leek society, the daughters of trades people and craftsmen. Using only four stitches, the embroiderers created exquisite work which they displayed in their shop and which encouraged sale of their patterns and silks both locally and by mail order.

The extent of Cathryn's research was admirable as there is no archive of the Society and only two documents which related to its work. Despite this, she managed to trace 88 of the women involved and she has now written a lavishly illustrated history of these talented women. Rose Wheat



#### Tuesday 24th March: Car Trip to Newcastle Fire Station

We were welcomed at the plush new fire station with tea and biscuits before splitting into two groups. My group were taken to the fire engine bay via the kit room which also contained a computer printer on which incoming information on incidents is fed to the crew as they are donning their equipment.

The modern fire engine is far removed from a horse pulling a bowser and contains a myriad of firefighting and rescue gear. It is easy to understand why a modern-day fire fighter has to undergo an extremely comprehensive training programme. There is clearly as much emphasis on rescue as there is on fire fighting. The vast range of synthetic materials used in 21<sup>st</sup>. century construction demands a knowledge of the products of combustion in these structures so that the most appropriate form of tackling the blaze can be utilised. However, water still remains the predominant fire extinguisher.

The Great Fire of London in 1666 was the catalyst for keeping a watchful eye on buildings but it was not until 1847 that local fire stations were formed but, even then, there was no cooperation or amalgamation among fire companies as they were assigned to individual insurance companies. Our guide then took us through a series of landmark dates in the history of fire brigades, the most significant being 1938 when the Fire Brigade Act was introduced which made it mandatory that each brigade helped one another, especially for large fires, leading to the formation of the National Fire Service in 1941. Since then there have been several re-organisations, many related to geography.

What was abundantly clear was that a modern fire fighter has to be fit (the gear alone adds 3 stone to a person's weight), brave and very knowledgeable. From in-cab computers to complex equipment to the vast range of materials used in modern life, coupled with a high level of fitness and commitment – a very demanding career requiring total dedication.

The visit was informative, enlightening and most enjoyable. Mick Wheat

Wednesday 4th March: Talk by Carole Williams: Mysterious China

We welcomed the Chinese New Year appropriately with fire-crackers (one party-popper actually) and already the mystery began – is it now the year of the goat, sheep or ram? The same Chinese character can be interpreted as any of these.

Carole introduced us to the basic principles of Chinese thought, starting with the "acceptance of paradox", finding the contrasting yin and yang, light and dark, in any situation, and how the Chinese people will always take their time assessing a problem before acting upon it. We took a whistle-stop tour, from the great cities of Beijing and Shanghai, taking in Jingdezhen,the porcelain-producing city which has been rivalling Stoke since 1700 and Xian with its terracotta army, and on to the less-populated central and western regions, with mountains and forests. Here we found the giant panda, and the even cuter golden snub-nosed monkey – aaah!

Chinese gardens are symbolic landscapes of rocks, trees and pathways. Water (yin) is always present to balance the yang of the rocks. The few flowers have special meanings – the chrysanthemum, for example, representing longevity.

Empress Dowager Cixi was a contemporary of Queen Victoria. She was selected as a teenager to be a concubine for the emperor, bore his son who became the next emperor, then chose her nephew to succeed when the son died. A woman of enormous influence over 50 years, she is known as the concubine who launched modern China. Carole took on the challenge of presenting a country with a quarter of the world's population, 56 distinct languages, and a 5,000 year dynastic history to us, all within an hour and a bit. She succeeded admirably, and will have whetted many appetites to visit China to find out for ourselves.
