#### **ARRANGEMENTS FOR TRIPS**

**Coaches** depart promptly from SCHOOL STREET, Newcastle, behind the Swimming Baths. Nearby long-stay parking. Should a member cancel their booking it is regretted that reimbursement is only possible if there is a waiting list. There will be a £2 per cheque handling charge. Members are requested not to find their own replacement. Non-members taking part in <u>coach</u> outings pay an additional £2. The committee has agreed that with rising numbers it is only fair that members should have priority when booking trips and holidays.

Members are asked to note that it is not possible for the coach to stop at places other than School Street to pick people up or drop them off on the outward or return journeys. The coach will not wait for members who are late, either at School Street or at other pick up points. Members are advised to take careful note of when or where they will be picked up. Anyone missing a coach will have no claim on the Association.

**Cheques** to be made payable to the "N. **Staffs. Association of NT Members**". Due to current banking procedure, please note that cheques are not cleared until after an event. Members are asked to write a separate cheque for each event they book. **Note:** The committee does not consider it proper that an event should incur a loss and therefore reserves the right to cancel should there be insufficient support.

#### For Your Safety and Enjoyment

Please look carefully at what is involved in an outing or a holiday before booking. Consider the starting time, the length of the day, the amount of walking and stair-climbing involved, the number of times of getting on and off a coach, etc. so that you can enjoy the day to the full by being able to participate in all aspects of the outing. #### A NOTE FROM THE CHAIR:

I am sure we are all glad to have seen the last of the winter snow, ice and frosts which have made 2009 the coldest winter for about 20 years. The National Trust has apparently lost many plants, especially in gardens in the south and south-west, where in recent milder years more tender specimens have flourished. The phrase 'global warming' does not seem very appropriate now but 'climate change' does sound more accurate. However, these losses, while to be lamented, also provide the opportunity for new planting schemes.

Remember the dreadful gales of 1987 when properties in the south, notably Nymans, lost an alarming number of mature trees and at the time it seemed a devastating blow? But the gardeners soon realised that areas which had been impossible to plant under the trees, once cleared, offered interesting new vistas and places for different types of plants. Lessons were also learned about the way to deal with the results of such damage, which was not to clear away everything tidily, but let nature take its course with the fallen trees.

Many members will have read with interest that the Trust is to make land available at some properties for the creation of allotments. This is certainly a response to the economic challenges of these times, though I'm not sure how quickly gardeners will be able to get their peas or cabbages from the plot to the plate if the plot is at the end of a long, elegant carriage drive, while the plate is some miles away in the town centre! Sit-on wheelbarrows with engines, perhaps?

Next year will be the 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of our Association and we hope to celebrate this important occasion in some appropriate way. I wrote to Sir

Simon Jenkins inviting him, as our new Chairman, to be our guest of honour in that year but sadly he declined as his calendar is already full. However, the Committee would welcome suggestions for a celebration – should it be a lunch, an outing, or a special visit somewhere? We eagerly await your ideas. Perhaps while you enjoy some of the summer outings you will have an inspired thought – pass it on to us!

#### **Little Moreton Hall Continues to Improve**

David Watts the Property Manager (writing in February) keeps us up to date on one of our local properties.

Friday 28th February looms large on the calendar; the start of the new season and the end of our preparations – well almost!

As with all properties we shall be open from 11.00 am, so that has meant changing lots of signs, but it does reflect what our visitors have been asking for and it is a positive move. As readers can well imagine, the final days before opening can seem really frantic. Today we have met a group of consultants who are writing an interpretation audit that will form the basis of a bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund to revitalise the interpretation at Little Moreton Hall, making the visitor experience even better. We are also meeting to discuss our final preparations before a walk through of the property to double check everything is in order. Staff are busily painting signs, installing new equipment and doing final batches of baking. Preseason recruitment is almost complete and we are delighted to say that we have 15 new volunteers starting to help us, particularly in the schools' programme, conservation in action and as garden guides, although we are still hoping to recruit more garden guides.

Pre-season training went really well – it was a pleasure to see old friends and outline how we have done in the last season and our plans for the next. It also gives us the opportunity to explain what has happened during the

closed season (virtual tour completed, Great Hall floor re-pointed, floors cleaned, stained and polished, Withdrawing Room fireplace completed, new family trail written, discovery trail produced for the estate walk, taste testing new cakes - the best bit!) As you can read, it has been a busy period but we are ready and waiting for the doors to be flung open on a lovely February morning and welcome, once again, our visitors.

#### REPORTS ON RECENT TALKS AND VISITS

#### Tuesday 9th December - Talk by David Morgan: What The Butler Did Next

David Morgan took up his post as Property Manager at Lyme Hall just two years ago, after having worked in New York in the Regis Hotel on 5th Avenue for many years as a butler and then as Assistant Manager . He emphasised the value of an English butler in such an establishment, which was originally built by Lord Astor as accommodation for his visitors to New York . The hotel was refurbished shortly before David's arrival and , in his words, "gold-leafed to death", as he showed in his slides of some of the interiors of the sumptuous place. He entertained us with anecdotes of some of the rich and famous guests, including royalty, film stars and politicians, and explained how the talents he had developed in dealing with guests were most useful in helping visitors to Lyme Park to benefit fully from their time there. He learned that impressions on arrival and departure are most important, that being prepared in advance is always advisable and that thanking staff for their efforts is appreciated.

He mentioned some of the changes he is bringing to Lyme Park and especially the refurbishment of the library. It is planned to allow visitors to sit there and even read the books, and to that end the chairs are being re-covered in velvet woven in France to the original design. The donation we gave him will go towards that project.

After the talk, we enjoyed mulled wine and mince pies and members studied the Archive files which Kay Williams had brought along, now splendidly updated.

# Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> January —Talk by John Honeysett: Reginald Mitchell and the story of the Spitfire.

Many of the large audience may already have been familiar through TV and Film with the story of the Spitfire, but Jon Honeysett, the speaker, soon demonstrated a personal contact. He started with a brief reference to Reginald Mitchell's childhood, with pictures of his birthplace and schools, and his interest in mathematics and engineering. But then his explanation of Mitchell's 1916 move to the Supermarine Co. (later Vickers Armstrong Supermarine) revealed that the speaker, although now living in Talke Pitts, was in fact a Southampton man.

Alongside the story of the Supermarine world-beating sea planes and the emergence of the prototype Spitfire with many photographs, pictures and paintings, we learned that his `Mam' had been a maid in the house next door to the Mitchells and had become friendly with Mrs Mitchell — sometimes looked after the children and had helped bake Reginald's favourite blackberry and apple pie with the blackberries the children had picked. His aunt had worked in the offices, his uncle in the factory. He related the awe his aunt had felt on going into the heavily wood panelled boardroom and how she would look out of the window at the sea planes at anchor in the harbour. Later in life she was to be a nurse to the chief test pilot.

The speaker's enthusiasm for his interest had led him into a lifetime of research, so that we saw, among the many pictures, copies of the specification for the early Spitfires and pre-war aerial photographs taken by the Luftwaffe in preparation for the later bombing of the factory which caused production of the Spitfire to be moved to West Bromwich. We heard how his uncle had told him of the workers running out of the bombed buildings to what they thought to be safety only to be strafed by planes on their return flight path. We also heard of conversations with test pilots and the engineer at Radway Green where the cannon for the later marques of the Spitfire were developed and produced.

And finally if the surviving 53 Spitfires capable of flight needed spare parts, the owners have to come to a small engineering works in Burslem, who still have all the blue prints and technical specifications for every version of the Spitfire.

#### Tuesday 17th February Talk by Andrew Dobraszczyc : Trentham in the Edwardian Period

Judging from the numbers of people passing into the N. Staffs Conference Centre, it was obvious that both subject and speaker were a major attraction. Despite not feeling fit, Andrew gave a riveting insight into Trentham during the Edwardian period, illustrated by postcards, newspaper advertisements, posters, private letters and maps.

He described the road and rail improvements taking place between Trentham and the surrounding area at that time. Local politics too were an issue including the federation and creation of the unified city of Stoke-on-Trent.

We learnt of the attractions to be enjoyed when visiting the Park (Admission 6d - Attractions extra) such as angling, boating, bowls and many more. The ballroom and the swimming pool were from a later period than Andrew was covering. The gardens themselves remained private.

What would the Duke say if he could see Trentham now?

Neil Crisp and Neil Cox, the landlords of the Leopard Hotel, have kindly offered to give members a guided tour of the Hotel.

In 1711 Ellen Wedgwood knocked together three cottages and established the Leopard Inn. In 1850 Charles Darwin enabled his



head cook and Butler to buy the hotel upon their marriage. The couple added a wing and the Leopard became a hotel with 138 rooms including 58 bedrooms spread over six floors. Many famous people including HG Wells, Charles Darwin, Dirk Bogarde and Ava Gardner have stayed at the Leopard. Following the outbreak of the Second World War, the accommodation was gradually closed until in 1951 the entire wing was closed and abandoned.

Our hosts will enlarge upon "her" history and members will be astonished to see the extent of this hotel whose frontage belies its size. This is a unique opportunity to see first hand a truly historic property in the old town of Burslem.

Members should note that much of the property has not been modernised since it was abandoned and members should be cautious of uneven floorboards and staircases and poorly lit areas.

### Talk by James Rothwell of the National Trust on the LYME MISSAL (following the AGM business).

This unique prayer book, the sole surviving copy of the Sarum Missal, was printed in Paris in 1465 for William Caxton. It is printed in red and black and is the first book that was printed in colour. It was in the ownership of the Legh family for several centuries then was at Lyme Park until 1946. We shall hear how the National Trust acquired this exceptional book and what it cost when James Rothwell tells us the story of this volume and explains its importance. In an age when the death of the printed word is sometimes predicted and communication is by texting or emailing, and when 'e-books' are suggested as the future of literature, it will be most interesting to understand why such an old piece of printing has such significance.

Founded in 1888 by William Hesketh Lever, later Viscount Leverhulme, for his soap factory workers, Port Sunlight is a lasting legacy of one of the most remarkable men of the modern age. It is one of Britain's finest and most picturesque garden villages. On arrival, after refreshment, we will visit the Port Sunlight Museum to watch an introductory film and see village memorabilia. We will then re-join our coach and be taken on a conducted tour, lasting an hour, around the village. From approximately 12.30 until the time we leave at 17.00 you will be on your own and free to have lunch, visit the Lady Lever Art Gallery, Christ Church and re-visit places of interest seen in the village during the tour.

For lunch you may bring a picnic, or visit one of the many places to eat in the village at your own expense. Places to eat are at the Lady Lever Art Gallery restaurant, the Port Sunlight Garden Centre Café, the village tearooms or at the Bridge Inn public house. Maps will be provided to help you find your way around the village.

The Lady Lever Art Gallery has many magnificent exhibits including one of the world's largest collections of Wedgwood china, sculpture, pottery and porcelain, tapestries and paintings by Reynolds, Wilson, Millais, Rossetti, Burne-Jones, Leighton, Etty, Turner and Constable. Christ Church, built in the Gothic Style, was opened in 1904 and a gift to the village from Lord Leverhulme. It is the largest church in the area.

There will be a considerable amount of standing and walking during the day and so sensible walking shoes should be worn and, regrettably, the visit would not be suitable for those with walking difficulties. For more information please visit www.portsunlightvillage.com.

Romantic, turreted, ancient, Madresfield Court, with its 160 rooms, spectacular Tudor Hall and medieval moat, has been home to the Lygon family for over 900 years and is a lived-in family home where the sumptuous lives next to the threadbare, the heraldic next to the domestic.

The Lygons were the inspiration and model for the doomed Marchmain family in Brideshead Revisited; were litigants in the case of the disputed legacy which inspired Bleak House; and provided Elgar's secret love behind the Enigma Variations.

Join us for this very special day and a rare opportunity to visit, as Evelyn Waugh often did, this private family home. A morning in Malvern can be spent visiting Malvern Priory, with its fine stained glass and medieval floor and wall tiles, St. Ann's Well, Malvern Museum, or simply shopping. Afternoon will see us stepping through the 12th century doors of Madresfield Court, which have no locks or handles as the house has never been left empty since it was built in 1198, for a guided tour.

After a guided tour there will be chance to see the gardens before afternoon tea provided by a local church.

# Saturday 17th October 11.00am Car Outing to Claymills Victorian Pumping Station, Meadow Lane, Stretton, Burton-on-Trent, Staffordshire. (Maximum 40)

The Pumping Station is run and managed by enthusiastic volunteers who love and devote a great deal of their spare time to the Pumping Station. Although the Station will be open to the public on this day (a private steaming is unaffordable) members will be given a guided tour in groups of approximately 15 and they will see the magnificence of the pumps working in all their glory. Their size is colossal. Other engines will be in steam.

The station includes 4 Beam engines by Gimson of Leicester 1885, 5 Lancashire boilers, steam-powered dynamo house, a Victorian steam workshop and the blacksmith's shop.

During the second half of the 19th century Burton-on-Trent and its brewing trade grew rapidly with consequential increase in polluted waste. In the 1880s James Mansergh, an eminent engineer was engaged to advise upon disposal of the waste and subsequently the Victorian steam-operated Claymills Pumping Station was built.

Members are strongly advised to wear stout and flat shoes and should be aware of the many trip hazards, uneven floors and ground, and oil and other spillages. Members should heed all advice offered by guides and observe any warning notes and avoid contact with all machinery.



The station is on five different levels with steep spiral stairs and grating type floors. For reasons of modesty, lady members may prefer to wear trousers.

Members should arrive not later than 11.00am and park their cars in the car park. Sharing cars would be helpful. Please indicate on the application form your willingness to share.
